GAME OVERVIEW

- The Stamps are on the road for the second time in 2009. The result of their first trip was a 42-30 loss to Winnipeg on July 10.
- Calgary is coming off a 44-9 home win over Toronto on July 17.
- Calgary was 6-3 on the road in 2008, while BC was 6-3 at BC Place.
- The Lions are coming off a 40-22 road win over Edmonton and their only home game of 2009 was a 31-28 loss to Hamilton.
- Calgary has 37 players back from its Grey Cup 46-man roster, including 12 offensive starters and seven defensive starters.
- Calgary has an all-time 89-71-5 regular-season record against BC.
- The Stamps won all four games against BC in 2008 — 28-18 at home on June 26, 36-29 in BC on Aug. 22, 41-30 at home on Nov. 1 and 22-18 in the West Final at home on Nov. 15.

- Stamps SB Nik Lewis has a reception in 91 consecutive games.
- The Stamps are 4-5-1 in their last 10 regular-season games against BC, including a current three-game winning streak.
- Calgary is 2-8 in its last 10 against the Lions at BC Place.
- Calgary had lost seven in a row at BC Place before winning there in 2008.
- Stamps QB Henry Burris is on pace to beat most of Doug Flutie's career franchise passing records by mid-season.
- Stamps K Sandro DeAngelis is the most accurate field goal kicker in CFL history (182-for-216, 84.3 per cent) and he is six-for-six in 2009.
- The Stamps and Lions both have plus-1 turnover ratios.
- BC ranks second in the CFL in passing yardage, while Calgary has the second-stingiest pass defence.



STAMPEDERS STORYLINES

STAMPS ON THE ROAD AGAIN

The Stamps are on the road for the second time of this 2009 season. Their last road trip resulted in a 42-30 loss to the Blue Bombers in Winnipeg on July 10. After this trip to Vancouver, the Stamps return to McMahon Stadium for back-to-back home games against Saskatchewan (Aug. 1) and Winnipeg (Aug. 8).

NUCLEUS INTACT

The Stamps have 37 players back from the 46 men who were on the 2008 Grey Cup roster. The only departures are: LB JoJuan Armour, DL Eddie Freeman, DL Howard Hodges, DL Charleston Hughes, DL Pat MacDonald, LB Saleem Rasheed, LB Neil Ternovatsky, OL Antonio Hall and QB Will Proctor.

In addition, all 12 Grey Cup offensive starters are back with the club, as are seven defensive starters.

NO. 1 CLOSING ON NO. 1

Burris currently sits second to Doug Flutie in most major franchise passing categories. If everything goes according to form this season, he will become the all-time leader in passing yards, touchdown passes, pass attempts and completions. Here's a look at how Burris fits into the club's leaderboards:

BURRIS SET TO BUILD ON 2008

Stamps quarterback Henry Burris had a career year in 2008 and was named the West Division nominee for Most Outstanding Player before he was the Grey Cup MVP.

Under his direction, the Stamps led the CFL with a 13-5 record and won two playoff games, including the Grey Cup over Montreal. Burris was particularly good when the games mattered most. He had a 10-3 record (including post-season) against teams with a winning record.

Burris also led all CFL quarterbacks with 595 rushing yards (career high is 623, in 2007), to go with a career-high 8.6 yards per carry and three touchdowns

Lewis set a Stamps record on Oct. 18, 2008 with receptions in his 86th consecutive game. Lewis caught three passes against the Saskatchewan Roughriders in his CFL debut (on June 20, 2004) and has been on the board in every game since.

RAMBO, REYNOLDS LED LEAGUE

For the first time in club history, the Stamps had the league's leading receiver and rusher in the same season. Ken-Yon Rambo and Joffrey Reynolds topped the CFL in receiving and rushing, respectively.

Rambo finished with 1,473 receiving yards on 100 receptions (third in CFL). Hall of Famer Allen Pitts was the last Calgary receiver to lead the league, when he had 97 catches for 1,449 yards in 1999. Here is a look at the complete list of CFL yardage leaders:

REYNOLDS IN FIFTH SPOT

Midway through the 2008 season, Reynolds moved past James Sykes into fifth spot on the club's all-time rushing chart. Over his first three full seasons, Reynolds rushed for 4,225 yards — an average of 1,408.3 per year. He became the fifth Stamps running back to go over 6,000 career rushing yards on Oct. 24 against Hamilton.

The Calgary Stampeders snapped a long run of bad results against BC by beating the Lions in the season-opener. Having won just once in their previous 10 meetings with BC, the Stamps defeated the Leos 28-18 at McMahon Stadium. Henry Burris ran for a touchdown, threw a pair of touchdown passes — one each to Ken-Yon Rambo and Chris Jackson — and Joffrey Reynolds rushed for 125 yards as the Stamps opened the season in front of 30,159 fans. Calgary's new-look defence held the Lions to 295 yards of total offence and just one touchdown until the game's dying seconds.

"It was a good start," said Stamps head coach/general manager John Hufnagel. "I thought our offence did a nice job of moving the ball. It would have been nice to come away with more points on some of the drives, but it was a good start. Defensively, our guys played hard. We had three injuries but everyone stepped up and made plays. There's a lot to build on. One thing I wasn't pleased with was the number of penalties we took (10), particularly in the first half (seven)." Calgary held the Lions to just 12 first downs — BC's lowest single-game total since 11 in the 2003 East (yes, that's correct) Division Semi-Final — and had four sacks, an interception, a turnover on downs and chased Lions quarterback Buck Pierce from the game when he was sacked by Juwan Simpson. Calgary's offensive line was under close scrutiny and allowed just one sack and few pressures while opening holes for 197 rushing yards on 31 carries.

A 36-29 decision gave the Calgary Stampeders their first win at BC Place since Aug. 1, 2002.

The game began with a bang for Calgary as Henry Burris completed his first pass to Ryan Thelwell for 31 yards and Joffrey Reynolds scored a 46-yard touchdown run on the next play. Reynolds finished with 124 yards on 15 carries, his third 100-yard game of the season, and moved past James Sykes into fifth spot on the team's all-time rushing list.

The Lions answered when Rolly Lumbala, a Calgary high-school product, scored on a one-yard run. The kickers then went to work, as Calgary's Sandro DeAngelis booted three field goals before halftime and Paul McCallum answered with a field goal and a rouge.

In the second half, Corey Banks intercepted Burris and returned it 40 yards for a score and an 18-16 Leos advantage. Calgary regained the lead when DeAngelis kicked his fourth field goal. Nik Lewis gave the Stamps a 26-18 cushion late in the third quarter when he caught an 18-yard pass from Burris.

Lions backup QB Buck Pierce came off the bench led the hosts on a 75-yard scoring drive capped by a three-yard pass to Jason Clermont and a two-point convert by Stefan Logan tied the game at 29-29.

Reynolds sparked the Stamps with a 44-yard kickoff return that gave them possession at BC's 51-yard line. Burris then completed back-to-back passes to Ken-Yon Rambo before Brett Ralph capped the drive with a five-yard touchdown catch.

The Calgary Stampeders wrapped up their most successful season since 1996 with a 41-30 home win over the BC Lions.

Starting quarterback Henry Burris led Calgary to 17-11 halftime lead before giving way to Barrick Nealy, who ran for 72 yards and three touchdowns and nailed down the win. Burris completed 11 of 18 passes for 165 yards and a touchdown to finish the season with a career-high 5,094 yards passing and 39 touchdowns.

Calgary receiver Ken-Yon Rambo finished the game with three catches for 81 yards to give him a total of 1,473 yards for the season and secure the league receiving title.

Stamps running back Joffrey Reynolds had just one carry for 15 yards and won the rush-ing title with 1,310 yards while Stamps kicker Sandro DeAngelis had 11 points to lead the league with a career-high 217 points.

BC led 4-3 before Burris marched the Stamps on a six-play, 75-yard scoring drive, cul-minating in a 21-yard touchdown run by Jon Cornish, his first major in the CFL. The Stamps later scored again when Burris tossed an 11-yard pass to Nik Lewis.

Nealy came into the game in the third quarter for Burris and scored his first CFL touch-down on a one-yard plunge.

After Lemarcus Rowell picked off Lions quarterback Buck Pierce, Nealy scrambled for a 14-yard touchdown to put Calgary up 31-21. The Lions pulled within three points when Pierce tossed a six-yard TD pass to Stefan Logan but Nealy ran for another one-yard score early in the fourth quarter to restore Calgary's 10-point advantage.

The Lions held the No. 2 offence in the CFL to less than 60 yards and just three first downs until Burris' 22-yard touchdown pass to Ken-Yon Rambo with nine seconds remaining in the first half.

Meanwhile, BC failed to score a TD despite having the ball inside the Calgary 30-yard line four times in the first half.

The Lions got all their points from the foot of Paul McCallum, who kicked six field goals from 23, 20, 35, 32, 30 and 12 yards. Calgary's Sandro DeAngelis booted field goals from 42 and 27 yards out in the third quarter.

Calgary defensive end Mike Labinjo had two sacks, forced a fumble and made two consecutive tackles to prevent a BC touchdown early in the second half. Labinjo twice stopped ball carrier Ian Smart and the Lions again had to settle for three points.

After trailing for three quarters, Burris gave the Stamps a 22-15 lead at 3:42 of the fourth when he punched the ball in from the one-yard line. Three minutes later, BC kept the pressure on with McCallum's sixth field goal of the game at 6:24, but cornerback Brandon Browner's interception with 1:19 remaining helped the Stamps seal the deal. BC had one last-gasp chance but quarterback Buck Pierce's Hail Mary attempt from 41 yards out on the final play of the game fell incomplete.

The Calgary Stampeders couldn't overcome a poor start or the kicking of Damon Duval in their 2009 season-opener at McMahon Stadium. The Stamps fell into an early 20-0 hole and wound up losing 40-27 to the Montreal Alouettes as the rematch of the 2008 Grey Cup produced a different winner.

Calgary had a late chance to take the lead thanks to a blocked punt by Tristan Black that gave the Stamps the ball at the Montreal 23-yard line. However, a sack of Henry Burris, a fumble and a recovery by Chip Cox led to a game-sealing 81-yard return touchdown. Calgary turned the ball over four times and also committed 10 penalties.

After a poor first quarter that saw Calgary fall behind 17-0, a couple of special plays by the special teams in the second quarter helped get the Stamps back into the contest. First, a spectacular 104-yard kickoff return by rookie Titus Ryan gave the home team its first points of the night.

Then, a blocked punt by Wes Lysack and a recovery by Dwight Anderson gave the Stamps the ball at the Montreal 31. Calgary capitalized with its second touchdown of the game, capping the drive with a four-yard touchdown pass from Burris to Jeremaine Copeland.

Calgary knotted the score at 27-27 with 10 third-quarter points. First, Burris scored a touchdown on a four-yard keeper and Sandro DeAngelis booted a 41-yard field goal to pull Calgary even.

The Alouettes were very sharp from the opening kickoff as they took the first drive 81 yards on five plays for a touchdown. Calvillo and Kerry Watkins connected on a 37-yard strike to complete the sequence. Second time with the ball, the Als doubled their lead as Avon Cobourne ran the ball in from 10 yards.

Costly turnovers, untimely penalties and, for a good part of the night, an ineffective offence added up the Calgary Stampeders' second straight loss to open the 2009 Canadian Football League season. Four Calgary giveaways led to four Winnipeg touchdowns at Canad Inns Stadium as Calgary dropped a 42-30 decision to the Blue Bombers.

For a second consecutive week, the Stampeders stumbled out of the gate.

The Blue Bombers' Mike Kelly — who collected his first win as a head coach on the night — resorted to some trickery on the game's opening kick-off as he asked Alexis Serna to boot the ball short. The play worked as Winnipeg recovered and that set up a five-play, 39-yard drive for a 24-yard Serna field goal.

After Calgary went two-and-out on its first possession, the Blue Bombers came right back to march the ball 67 yards for a touchdown. The drive was capped by an eight-yard touchdown pass from Stefan LeFors to Terrence Edwards. Winnipeg added a second LeFors-to-Edwards touchdown connection late in the opening half.

The clubs traded short touchdowns runs in the third quarter. First, it was Lavarus Giles running the ball in from the two for the Bombers' third touchdown of the night. The Stamps replied with their first major as Joffrey Reynolds caught a pitch and scored from the one-yard line.

The Stamps tried to mount a comeback with a 99-yard drive that was capped by Henry Burris' one-yard keeper for a touchdown, but the Bombers bounced right back with an interception return for touchdown by Siddeeq Shabazz. Giles' second touchdown run of the game was essentially the icing on the cake for the Bombers. Barrick Nealy, who relieved Burris, led the Red and White on a couple of late touchdown drives to make the final score somewhat more respectable. The Calgary Stampeders defence obviously had enough.

After allowing 82 points in the first two games of the season, the Stamps kept the Toronto Argonauts in check and recorded a 44-9 victory Friday at McMahon Stadium. The win was Calgary's first of 2009 and allows the Stampeders to pull into a three-way tie for second place in the West Division with Edmonton and BC.

Not only did the defence record six sacks and hold the Argos out of the end-zone, the unit scored three touchdowns — one on Dwaine Carpenter's fumble return and two on interception returns by Dwight Anderson and Brandon Browner.

Running back Joffrey Reynolds scored a couple of touchdowns for Calgary — one rushing and one receiving — as the Stampeders extended their home-field winning streak against the Boatmen to four games.

For the first time this season, the Stampeders opened the scoring as Reynolds ran the ball in from the one-yard line in the opening quarter.

With the touchdown, Reynolds moved past Willie Burden and into fifth place on the Stampeders' all-time list in rushing majors. The two great running backs started the night tied with 32 rushing touchdowns apiece.

During the first half, Henry Burris moved past Jeff Garcia (2,358 yards) to become the leading all-time rusher among Stampeders quarterbacks. He also surpassed Hugh McKinnis (2,357) and took over seventh spot on the overall all-time Stamps rushing list.

One of the turning points of the night came on the final play of the third quarter. The Argos set up in the Wildcat formation with running back Jamal Robertson taking the snap. Robertson handed the ball to quarterback Kerry Joseph, who was immediately pressured. Carpenter hit Joseph, forced the fumble, recovered the ball and ran it back 55 yards for a touchdown.

Calgary signed Johnson as a free agent in June of 2008. He was drafted by the Oakland Raiders in the second round (63rd overall) of the 2003 NFL draft. He was signed by the Arizona Cardinals in 2005.
